Dear People of God,

I have proposed a theory that there are seven sacraments because, when push comes to shove, we humans will undertake essentially only seven basic actions. Everything we do can be categorized in terms of one or another of those seven basic activities. I hope you've been keeping track so you can try and prove there's an eighth when this little series is completed in another few weeks. So far I've explored beginnings (Baptism), commitments (Confirmation) and sharing meals (Eucharist). Today I want to look at the first of two sacraments of healing: Reconciliation.

Sacramental reconciliation has come on hard times over the past several decades and I'm not sure why although I would hazard to guess it is the sad result of far too many clergy seeing it as a way to punish rather than to reveal God's great mercy. Keep in mind that mercy is the framework because, after all, one of the seven basic human activities is to apologize or act when we're sorry for an action, a perception, or some words we gave to others that are "offensive." We show the offended our regret and expect mercy in return. Children are taught to say "I'm sorry" at an early age and then never stop saying it to others, perhaps at work, at play, at school, at home, among strangers, or at the grocery store. All over the world "I'm sorry" is a universals human refrain and rouses the response of "apology accepted" in those or similar words. Today we even apologize for the acts of others from hundreds or even thousands of years into the past, as if we are responsible for what somebody did way back when to offend somebody else.

Reconciliation is, at its base, the repair of a broken relationship. Because we humans are fragile and weakened by original sin, it's easy to break down those relationships we are meant to make stronger. Because this urgency to make repairs is so wonderfully human, it's led to a built-in sense of doing so, often without thinking first because we want it to happen just that fast. A simple "excuse me" builds up the bonds between people with very little effort; just stop to think how often you've said those or similar words over the past few weeks and months.

By making himself present in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, Jesus reminds us that any time we undertake to say "I'm sorry" and give and receive mercy, we are doing something innately holy and which raises the holiness level in the lives of others. That universal call to holiness I mentioned at the outset of this series isn't all that hard to manage; in fact, it's the human adventure.

The Celebration of Sacraments

Infant Baptism: The Sacrament of Baptism is regularly celebrated on Sunday during or after the Eucharistic Liturgy. Registered parishioners are asked to arrange for the Baptismal Preparation Class and the Liturgical Celebration by calling the Parish Office.

<u>Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults</u>: RCIA is the process of growing in your faith and love of God. Weekly gatherings take place from September until Easter. Penance: The Sacrament of Penance is celebrated at 3:30 p.m. on Saturday at IC, 9:30 a.m. at HSP and 10:30 a.m. at IC every Sunday or by appointment.

Matrimony: Anyone planning to be married must contact the parish at least six months in advance. The exact date and time of your wedding should not be determined until after consultation with a priest or deacon. If either party has previously been civilly or religiously married, the Presider is not permitted to set a date for the wedding without resolving the previous marriage.

Pastoral Care of the Sick: When a parishioner is admitted to the hospital, nursing home, or confined to home because of age or infirmity, please call the Parish Office. Parishioners are ready to visit and to bring Holy Communion. When one is seriously ill, the healing Presence of the Lord should be requested in the Sacrament of the Sick.
