Dear People of God,

Watching the news the other day, I heard one of the talking heads say that the Coronavirus is a "plague of biblical proportions." I'm not sure he understood what biblical proportions are, but I got the idea that he meant the pandemic is truly a world-wide disaster. It got me thinking about what "biblical proportions" really means; if we go back and look at the biblical stories of great disasters, we can discover a few things that we might want to consider today as we battle the pandemic.

First and foremost, the talking head on the news broadcast was right: a biblical disaster affects all of humanity. The pandemic began in China but quickly spread all across the globe, affecting rich and poor nations alike. As with most such global disasters, we really don't know what to do. Science thinks it can address the problem, but it's really guesswork as the changing directives from WHO and the CDC have shown over these past several months. And just as it looks like science has discovered the who, what, why and how of controlling the disaster, it reaches out to show that it's in charge, not us. That brings me to the second point about real biblical disasters: They are generally related to human arrogance, pride and, yes, sin.

We humans believe we know it all and can do it all, an attitude that often leads to terrible accidents and inventive genius that threatens the very existence of humanity. Perhaps the greatest of these human-made disasters are gun violence and drug abuse, both of which are the direct result of human ingenuity (or biblical arrogance) thinking it can address all the world's problems with simple solutions; however, those simple solutions often fail to consider the dignity of the human person. At the same time, the brilliant people behind those simple solutions often find cause to horde the solution to themselves for personal gain of wealth, prestige, or power. You may or may not believe that humanity itself is causing global warming but that's not the disaster in waiting. What we do to address warming trends, whether man-made or natural, will affect the lives of billions, particularly in the poorest parts of the world.

Finally, the third aspect of a disaster of truly biblical proportions is the "end game," i.e., the results which come about because of the disaster. We're reading about some of them in the newspapers already: rising rates of suicide, spousal abuse and other domestic violence, drug use, starvation in the Third World, increased migration (and often of the poorest, most undereducated people who receive an inhospitable welcome), street violence, insurrection, and even civil wars. We read of the potential for serious health and mental side effects of the pandemic which will not have their day for years to come and we don't have the vaguest idea just where all of that will end. And that's the tragedy of a disaster of biblical proportions: it changes the world, often yielding up new and radically different cultural systems bearing little resemblance to what was. The Greeks and Romans referred to these world-changing moments as the "end of the age" and we might wonder what the end of the current age will bring. The Bible urges repentance so that the change won't be for the worse.

The Celebration of Sacraments

Infant Baptism: The Sacrament of Baptism is regularly celebrated on Sunday during or after the Eucharistic Liturgy. Registered parishioners are asked to arrange for the Baptismal Preparation Class and the Liturgical Celebration by calling the Parish Office.

Penance: The Sacrament of Penance is celebrated at 3:30 p.m. on Saturday at IC, 9:30 a.m. at HSP and 10:30 a.m. at IC every Sunday or by appointment.

Matrimony: Anyone planning to be married must contact the parish at least six months in advance. The exact date and time of your wedding should not be determined until after consultation with a priest or deacon. If either party has previously been civilly or religiously married, the Presider is not permitted to set a date for the wedding without resolving the previous marriage.

Pastoral Care of the Sick: When a parishioner is admitted to the hospital, nursing home, or confined to home because of age or infirmity, please call the Parish Office. Parishioners are ready to visit and to bring Holy Communion. When one is seriously ill, the healing Presence of the Lord should be requested in the Sacrament of the Sick.





Snow Emergency

Whenever a county/city within the Diocese of Toledo is placed under a Level 3 Snow Emergency during which all roadways are closed to non-emergency personnel, the Catholic Churches within that geographic region will cancel the scheduled Saturday Vigil, Sunday, or Holy Day Masses. Roman Catholics in that region, therefore, are dispensed from the obligation to attend Mass. If Masses are cancelled, Catholics are encouraged to participate in Holy Mass via television, radio or internet, making a spiritual Communion. When Mass is cancelled, all other diocesan, parish, or school events in the geographic area are also cancelled.


