Although we had been in a series last explored in early December, I will again indulge in an interruption to focus instead on today's National Holiday that is falling on a Sunday. I want to touch on the idea of a "new year."

Scientifically all cultures have recognized the cyclic movement of the earth through the heavens which repeats the seasons. Each intuited that this cycle took about twelve months or what was considered a year although the formal name of that cycle was rarely "year" even it meant a twelve-month cycle (or whatever divisions of time the culture attached to the overall annual periodicity) beginning anew. Many cultures, relying on grain for their survival, equated the time to plant as the beginning since the rest of the year was devoted to caring for and harvesting what was begun as seeds. Others were far more concerned about the moon and its progress through the skies and developed lunar calendars which "began" on some particular alignment of the moon. One would think that our calendar would have followed the lead of the Greco-Roman calendar which had been organized as a grain calendar so began with the spring planting season. Instead it begins closer to that mystic day in early winter when the human eye can detect that the sun isn't going to sink permanently behind the horizon and never rise again! Many cultures held vigils for days on end to watch for that celestial event because they knew no grain would grow in the dark, few of their food animals were up at night and sunshine was a necessity for civilized life. Fear drove the new year but it gave way to huge celebrations of joy once everyone was reassured the sun would shine.

We no longer await the news of the heavenly circuit of the sun's movement – we've created too many other sources of light that ease our fear of the dark. However, we do celebrate New Year's and often do so with light. The ball in New York would be pretty meaningless if it weren't lit up, and in the south where there's little snow, fireworks light up the sky. Our religious celebration of the new year focuses on the family – Mary and Joseph and their child who constitute a complete family unit. It's a family like many today, the child related directly only to one parent, but it was a Holy Family because it shared the "secret ingredient" of love. As we now look forward to the Epiphany, may we all have the wisdom to bring gifts to our families: the gifts of love, care, compassion and mercy. Let us make this new year a time of love.

The Celebration of Sacraments

Penance: The Sacrament of Penance is celebrated at 3:30 p.m. on Saturday at IC, 9:30 a.m. at HSP and 10:30 a.m. at IC every Sunday or by appointment.

Matrimony: Anyone planning to be married must contact the parish at least six months in advance. The exact date and time of your wedding should not be determined until after consultation with a priest or deacon. If either party has previously been civilly or religiously married, the Presider is not permitted to set a date for the wedding without resolving the previous marriage.

Pastoral Care of the Sick: When a parishioner is admitted to the hospital, nursing home, or confined to home because of age or infirmity, please call the Parish Office. Parishioners are ready to visit and to bring Holy Communion. When one is seriously ill, the healing Presence of the Lord should be requested in the Sacrament of the Sick.





Health News for January 1, 2023

What is concierge medicine? For an annual "membership" fee, concierge or retainer-based medicine promises patients more time with — and more access to — their doctors. The annual fee allows doctors to have fewer patients and less paperwork. In turn, they hope that they will have more time for individual patients. There are several variations of this model. Some have lower costs and fewer services, while others offer different tiers of service based on the cost of the annual membership fee. If you are a patient at a concierge practice, you still need insurance, both for office visits and for care outside the practice, like hospitalizations, tests, or specialists. However, you generally will not pay a copay for each visit. Some

practices, often called direct primary care practices, do not accept insurance and patients pay at each visit.

CCFMC will continue working with St. John's Jesuit, St. Ursula Academy, and Catholic Charities to provide free medical care to the low income and homeless through the Labre Street Clinic every Monday evening (except Level 3 snow emergencies): 5:30pm-6: 30pm at 235 Courtland Ave. In the parking lot behind Queen of Apostles School 6:30pm - 7:30pm In the parking lot of St. Louis Helping Hands 443 Sixth Street. Historic South Initiative Home Repair Program

Historic South Initiative's home repair program helps residents in the Old South End repair issues to the outside of their home that are related to lead hazards, safety, and sanitation. The following repairs qualify:

- -New windows and/or doors
- -New siding and/or painting
- -Roof repair and/or replacement
- -Gutter replacement
- -Exterior asbestos removal

Once an application is received and approved, Historic South will inspect the home and determine what can be done. A grant to the resident is then awarded based on income. The average grant is \$15,000.

To qualify, you must meet these requirements:

- Be in the target area of I-75 highway to Broadway to Walbridge Ave, back to I-75.
- Be the owner of the property. •
- Be current on home taxes. If not current, must make a down payment towards a payment plan and pay up to 3 months before being eligible.
- House having a sound structural quality.
