Dear People of God,

To dig deeper into the gaps we can see in the pews, I will momentarily turn to the gospels. Scholars are always doing their best to explain what's going on in the four canonical gospels; one of the areas they examine closely is Jesus' actual words. We know that the four authors didn't mind editing some of them to fit into the themes they were sharing with the community, but there are a few which were considered so vital to Jesus' message that they were not changed in any sense. There aren't a lot but if the original writers thought them so essential that they dared not edit them, then we ought to take a look at a few in terms of today's Church and how it functions or fails to do so. Here's one of them:

I came to serve, not to be served.

Mass attendance today reflects the failure of people to heed that essential element of being a Christian: service. Indeed, our contemporary culture has done a lot to erode the proper relationships between people, whether in the Church or in secular situations. Today people come to be served, not to serve. It's called the "entitlement society" and simply means we all tend to expect somebody else to do the work, pay the freight, carry the burden, provide for our wants, give us everything we should be working for and otherwise get a free ride through life. It's nothing new which is why Jesus so boldly said it two thousand years ago. History has a few examples such as the incessant moaning and groaning of the Hebrews for forty years as they trekked to the Promised Land, the expectation of the Roman population for "bread and circuses," and a host of current entitlement programs. The problem with all of this is that it comes crashing down when there are more people entitled than there are people willing to carry the load for everybody else. Entitlement destroys economies, brings down nations and contributes to the decline in active participation in the work of the Church which is service.

Parishes and dioceses exist not to be served but to serve; the people who make up parishes and dioceses must be ready and willing to undertake the essential services which Jesus wanted performed. It's part of the obligation we accepted at baptism (and which we continue to accept when we proclaim the Faith every Sunday). We or our parents responded (and we continue to do so when we renew our baptismal promises, especially at Easter) by saying "We are!" to the question asked by the priest or deacon: "Are you ready to accept these obligations?"

Primary among the obligations of baptism are two named in the Great Commission Jesus gave as he ascended into heaven: teach and baptize (which means all of the necessary behaviors which would lead anyone to want to be baptized). If we fall into an entitlement attitude, then we're content to let somebody else do the teaching, either formally or informally by the way of life a Christian ought to be demonstrating to the world. We're quite happy to do nothing and expect somebody else to undertake all of the necessary work required to invite, catechize, instruct, inform and prepare men and women for baptism. Entitlement in the Church is nothing less than a spiritual ennui which makes us become the lukewarm individuals whom Jesus has said he will vomit up at the final judgment. In the here and now entitlement means fewer people responding to the summons to make their pilgrim way with us toward the Kingdom. That means fewer people in the pews. That means less regular income to undertake maintenance and ministry. That means parishes close and people who feel entitled wonder why.

Until next week, consider how you might respond to the summons to serve.

The Celebration of Sacraments

Infant Baptism: The Sacrament of Baptism is regularly celebrated during or after the Eucharistic Liturgy. Registered parishioners are asked to arrange for the Baptismal Preparation Class and the Liturgical Celebration by calling the Parish Office.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults: RCIA is the process of growing in your faith and love of God. Weekly gatherings take place from September until Easter. If you are interested in learning about Catholicism and joining us please call the church @ 419-243-1829.

Penance: The Sacrament of Penance is celebrated at 3:30 p.m. on Saturday at IC, 9:30 a.m. at HSP and 10:30 a.m. at IC every Sunday or by appointment.

Matrimony: Anyone planning to be married must contact the parish at least six months in advance. The exact date and time of your wedding should not be determined until after consultation with a priest or deacon. If either party has previously been civilly or religiously married, the Presider is not permitted to set a date for the wedding without resolving the previous marriage.

Pastoral Care of the Sick: When a parishioner is admitted to the hospital, nursing home, or confined to home because of age or infirmity, please call the Parish Office. Parishioners are ready to visit and to bring Holy Communion. When one is seriously ill, the healing Presence of the Lord should be requested in the Sacrament of the Sick.



Health News for April 30, 2023





• Colonoscopy. Similar to flexible sigmoidoscopy, except the health care provider uses a longer, thin, flexible, lighted tube to check for polyps or cancer inside the rectum and the entire colon. During the test, the health care provide can find and remove most polyps and some cancers. Colonoscopy may also be used as a follow-up test of one of the other screenings tests finds anything unusual. CT Colonography (Virtual Colonoscopy). Computed tomography (CT) colonography uses X-rays and computers to produce images of the entire colon. The images are displayed on a computer screen for the health care provide to analyze.

Your health care provider will discuss your test results with you. Depending on your results, you may need a follow-up appointment or another screening test.


