

Dear People of God,

Over the past several weeks I've been looking at why Mass attendance is so small these days. To help understand one of the powerful dynamics at work, I've simplified the ordinary duties of Catholics in terms of time, talent and treasure. Today I'd like to focus in on that last one: **treasure**.

All of us have some access to treasure. It can be income, inheritance, retirement savings, Social Security, stocks, property, the Megabucks lottery, or even trading in pop bottles across the border in Michigan. (as a kid I used to hunt pop bottles tossed out by rich people who didn't need the 2 cent deposit because I didn't get an allowance and had to work for what cash I had access to. The lawn mower was a push model, none of this fancy power stuff, and the snow removal system was a shovel, not a blower). Some of us have more access than others, thanks to the talents God gave us and which we invested in an education or vocational training. Because we're members of an ecclesial community bonded to Jesus Christ by baptism, we have an obligation to share some of that treasure with the community, ordinarily the parish, but there are diocesan and larger components of the Body of Christ to consider as well.

The treasure we share with the parish goes to heating the buildings, turning on the lights, keeping the sidewalks clean and safe, preparing the space for worship, security, restrooms and all the things we take for granted when we come to Church. Our gift of treasure should underwrite all of the necessary expenses required to do what the parish must do. If the sharing of treasure permits, then the parish can add other ministerial programs like Bible Study, adult formation, school tuition and a host of other wonderful programs which would benefit the growth and development of the parish.

There is no expectation as to how much treasure we should be offering to God's work but everyone should think of this as an obligation created by baptism and do what one's ability might be. That means everybody will make a different offering which accords to their ability, so over the years the "ask" has been for a sacrificial gift rather than spare change. This comes from the story in the gospels where Jesus sees a widow place two small coins in the collection and he tells his disciples hers was a truly sacrificial gift because it was all she had.

Many of our Protestant brothers and sisters are asked to consider ten percent which they refer to as a tithe. Some big box churches ask to see members' tax returns and assess an annual donation based on real numbers. Our Catholic notion of generosity and sacrifice is Biblical and refers to what we offer as being the "first fruits" which means we offer God something in thanks for what we have received. The amount is secondary to the motivation for the giving which should be to honor the real source of what treasure we have: God.

Many needs arise around us and those first fruits should be shared with the Church and some of those other pressing needs in the community and the world. How that works out is always up to individuals who may have favorite charities to which they wish to give something. Unfortunately, an entitlement mentality often intervenes and leads to quick complaints about a dusty rail, a burned out light bulb, papers scattered in the pews or some other perceived indignity to one's personal expectations. Yet the complainer never shows up for a "spring cleaning" effort, or offers to rent the scaffold or hi-lift necessary to replace a light bulb.

Light bulbs seems to be a particular favorite in the complaint area. A lift costs \$2500 a day and to make it cost effective to rent one, there may be a lot of burned out bulbs before the parish can afford to replace them! This is just one infrequently recognized use for the treasure we choose to share but it also demonstrates the factors those managing the church finances must balance...and they do.

The Celebration of Sacraments

Infant Baptism: The Sacrament of Baptism is regularly celebrated during or after the Eucharistic Liturgy. Registered parishioners are asked to arrange for the Baptismal Preparation Class and the Liturgical Celebration by calling the Parish Office.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults: RCIA is the process of growing in your faith and love of God. Weekly gatherings take place from September until Easter. If you are interested in learning about Catholicism and joining us please call the church @ 419-243-1829.

Penance: The Sacrament of Penance is celebrated at 3:30 p.m. on Saturday at IC, 9:30 a.m. at HSP and 10:30 a.m. at IC every Sunday or by appointment.

Matrimony: Anyone planning to be married must contact the parish at least six months in advance. The exact date and time of your wedding should not be determined until after consultation with a priest or deacon. If either party has previously been civilly or religiously married, the Presider is not permitted to set a date for the wedding without resolving the previous marriage.

Pastoral Care of the Sick: When a parishioner is admitted to the hospital, nursing home, or confined to home because of age or infirmity, please call the Parish Office. Parishioners are ready to visit and to bring Holy Communion. When one is seriously ill, the healing Presence of the Lord should be requested in the Sacrament of the Sick.



Health News for June 18, 2023



What to Do When Your Medication Is Not Covered: Apply for a patient assistance or manufacturer copay **program.** Patient assistance and manufacturer copay programs help people save on specific medications – particularly costly, brand-name ones that are often not covered by insurance. These programs can reduce out-of-pocket costs to \$0 per month for people with and without insurance. Keep in mind: Patient assistance programs generally serve the uninsured, while manufacturer copay programs are for those with insurance. You can typically find these programs on the websites of the drug manufacturers. The companies often have partnerships with nonprofit organizations that connect people in need with medication discounts. You can also find these programs through GoodRx. Just search for your medication on Good Rx.com and scroll down to information about ways to save.


