26th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Amen, I say you, tax collectors and prostitutes are entering the kingdom of God before you." *Matthew 21:31*

Dear People of God,

The history of the Bible reinforces our desire to think that something good can come from something bad. Thus the destruction of the scrolls caused by the fall of the Temple in Jerusalem in 70 A.D. became the catalyst for a group of scholars to undertake the daunting task of creating a more permanent written collection that could be copied and distributed.

Once they got together, drawn from all over the ancient world, there were particular collections linked to the Samaritan community (3000 B.C.), the Egyptian community (1200 B.C.), the Babylonian community (400 B.C.), the Roman community (100 B.C.) and what was left of the Palestinian community (up to around 50 B.C. and which includes the Qumran/Dead Sea compilers) – all of which had one or two very different texts in their collections. The collators discovered that there were a lot of things not commonly held by all of these various communities. The key task became to sift and sort and determine which of the numerous books should be included in what was to become the universal collection. To keep the end product from growing too large, some ancient works were edited and combined to form a single book. It was not an easy project by any means with a lot of give and take over some of the proposed books which never made it (but are available in writing for those interested in looking at The Lost Books of the Bible and the Forgotten Books of Eden, most of which you can tell why they got lost after reading a few pages). The completed collection, which was assembled specifically to be copied and disseminated, formed the first accepted Jewish Testament and is referred to as the Masoretic Text used by faithful Jews today. It included the twenty-four books still used by faithful Jews worldwide. A competing collection, the one Christianity would use in formulating the books of the Old Testament, is the Septuagint (seventy-two) which was being widely circulated when the events of Jesus' saving acts occurred. The Septuagint was not in the ancient Hebrew language so many Hebrew scholars discounted its accuracy.

The Septuagint collection predated Jesus while the Masoretic collection actually came after the time of Jesus but both were being widely circulated so that the precious texts would be protected from loss by being copied and held by hundreds of Jewish places of worship. Certain of the texts held a preeminent place in ordinary worship due to their significant content, among them the first five books [Pentatuch] which were credited to Moses, and the Prophets Jeremiah and Isaiah. Others were relegated primarily to schools whose students were to become masters of the larger collection so they could be the teachers of those who could not read. Only minimal copies of those texts exist today because very few actually made it into written form. For hundreds of years into the Christian era, very few ordinary people on the street ever had a copy of the Old Testament. The cost was prohibitive as papyrus, vellum and parchment were rare and expensive, as was any ink which would not fade away after a few months in the light. Each copy had to be entirely created by hand, meticulously copied from one hand-written copy to the new one; the smaller the letters, the less expensive the finished product so the appearance of large, illustrated copies did not occur until well into the Middle Ages. Most of the ancient scrolls and later books were created for wealthy Jewish communities which had only one copy so if the wealthy community was destroyed for any reason, the copy was lost; few families could afford their own copy so there are not a lot of early texts surviving. Because of this, Jewish Sacred Scripture for the people in the pew was limited to what they could hear, not what they could read. In a sense the Old Testament for the people in the pew remained what they had always been: oral stories.

How is this process also evident in the popular stories (Paul Bunyan, George Washington, Johnny Appleseed) in our culture? Or in your own family stories? Is your knowledge based on having read written versions or having heard oral legends? Do you have a preference?

The Celebration of Sacraments

Infant Baptism: The Sacrament of Baptism is regularly celebrated during or after the Eucharistic Liturgy. Registered parishioners are asked to arrange for the Baptismal Preparation Class and the Liturgical Celebration by calling the Parish Office.

<u>Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults</u>: RCIA is the process of growing in your faith and love of God. Weekly gatherings take place from September until Easter. If you are interested in learning about Catholicism and joining us please call the church @ 419-243-1829.

Penance: The Sacrament of Penance is celebrated at 3:30 p.m. on Saturday at IC, 9:30 a.m. at HSP and 10:30 a.m. at IC every Sunday or by appointment.

Matrimony: Anyone planning to be married must contact the parish at least six months in advance. The exact date and time of your wedding should not be determined until after consultation with a priest or deacon. If either party has previously been civilly or religiously married, the Presider is not permitted to set a date for the wedding without resolving the previous marriage.

Pastoral Care of the Sick: When a parishioner is admitted to the hospital, nursing home, or confined to home because of age or infirmity, please call the Parish Office. Parishioners are ready to visit and to bring Holy Communion. When one is seriously ill, the healing Presence of the Lord should be requested in the Sacrament of the Sick.
