#### Dear People of God,

The highly reputed scholars who determined to rectify the loss of the ancient scrolls by compiling a permanent copiable collection actually produced competing texts; one (still used) is the first Jerusalem Testament and the other, the Septuagint, is the precursor to the Christian Old Testament.

Keeping in mind that the Christian Church was founded in Jerusalem and its theological roots remained there for some time, it was the collection of writings there (the Septuagint which Jesus quotes) most often referred to and incorporated into regular use by the Christian community as it moved away from Jerusalem. St. Paul is generally referring to that collection when he mentions Sacred Scripture. In his period (up to around 67 when he was executed by the Emperor), no real need existed for any specific Christian collection of writings because plenty of living witnesses could testify to Jesus and his works (Paul states that Jesus appeared after the Resurrection to a group of at least five thousand).

However, people don't live forever and as the number of eye-witnesses to the events of salvation began to die and the Church spread far off from any of those eyewitnesses, numerous attempts were made to write down what people heard or what those few eye-witnesses had seen. At the same time, two other strands of writing were beginning to appear. One was a type of theological reflection (it's still around today) which sought to protect the mystery of salvation rather than its universality (e.g. its followers believe that a limited number will be caught up in the rapture). You can find a Greco-Roman version of this by looking up Roman (or Greek) Mystery Religions; it is likely that converts from this pagan movement brought along the notion of some secret information or behavior which assured salvation. These so-called Gnostic texts focused on three general themes: (1) the material world was evil, (2) you better know the secret to salvation or you were lost and (3) the established religions (Gnosticism was popular with both Jews and Christians), their traditions and so-called theologians were not going to be of any help in discovering the secret knowledge; it was given by the divine. The development came to be known as the Gnostic (knowing) movement.

In parts of the Empire, Gnosticism was quite popular and attracted a large following; however, the risk of such a theory is that it becomes too exclusive and too other worldly due to its focus on an after-life. We see this today in a few Christian denominations, often referred to as cults, which insist they have the secret to being saved (usually after making a very large donation to the so-called Master) and which decry the well-established or main-stream religions and call for a big separation from this cold, cruel world.

Another strand in scholarly efforts to recreate the content of the destroyed scrolls adopted a different approach. Relying on what people had once witnessed or heard of Jesus, these scholars engaged in highly speculative writing to explain memories as the writers understood them. Much of what they wrote they believed but today we would consider it "made up." (If you're interested, take a look at the tome mentioned earlier in this series, Lost Books of the Bible). The idea behind this strand was to popularize the events and people of the earliest days of the Church in an attempt to flesh out the personalities of the Church's founders.

Mainstream Christianity in its early period understood Scripture as entirely what had been handed on by the Jewish community, so for 75 to 100 years, people had no New Testament to refer to other than a few sayings of Jesus passed down by word of mouth. The earliest writings commonly available were the letters of St. Paul; he uses Scripture (the Old Testament of which he was an acknowledged scholar) as commentary on the oral recollection of Jesus' life and ministry. He fills in the blank spaces of prophesy by making the connection to Jesus as the promised savior whom he has concluded is the very God who alone can save. However, not all the blank spaces were filled in: a notable missing element was explaining the "why and wherefore" of Jesus saving acts. God's love was an omission that would eventually be corrected. Note that our Bible's narrative consistently reiterates the Great commandment about loving God and our neighbor as ourselves.

# The Celebration of Sacraments

**Infant Baptism**: The Sacrament of Baptism is regularly celebrated during or after the Eucharistic Liturgy. Registered parishioners are asked to arrange for the Baptismal Preparation Class and the Liturgical Celebration by calling the Parish Office.

**<u>Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults</u>**: RCIA is the process of growing in your faith and love of God. Weekly gatherings take place from September until Easter. If you are interested in learning about Catholicism and joining us please call the church @ 419-243-1829.

**Penance:** The Sacrament of Penance is celebrated at 3:30 p.m. on Saturday at IC, 9:30 a.m. at HSP and 10:30 a.m. at IC every Sunday or by appointment.

**Matrimony**: Anyone planning to be married must contact the parish at least six months in advance. The exact date and time of your wedding should not be determined until after consultation with a priest or deacon. If either party has previously been civilly or religiously married, the Presider is not permitted to set a date for the wedding without resolving the previous marriage.

**Pastoral Care of the Sick**: When a parishioner is admitted to the hospital, nursing home, or confined to home because of age or infirmity, please call the Parish Office. Parishioners are ready to visit and to bring Holy Communion. When one is seriously ill, the healing Presence of the Lord should be requested in the Sacrament of the Sick.
