Dear People of God,

As we trace the steps in the creation of our Bible, the next step emerged after the 1st century; scholars had recognized both the overlap and the differences in the diverse collections of mryiad local churches. Thus when gathered at a regional assembly, they engaged in a successful collaborative effort to develop a "canon" of essential points for their region. Going beyond the Old Testament, they wanted to answer the "why and wherefore" of Jesus' acts. They had the writings of gospel writers Matthew, Mark, Luke and John whose content reflected the previously neglected Love of God theme.

By the third century these regional gatherings grew to become major Councils at which hundreds of local Churches came together. A similar culling process at each gathering trimmed the common collection even more. One of the first such lists was assembled at the end of the second century by St. Irenaeus, Bishop of Lyons in southern France, as a means of combating some of the Gnostics who challenged 3 bedrocks of Christianity: (1) Scripture (which Irenaeus wanted to codify so that there would be a common body of sacred writings), (2) tradition (I handed on to you what I myself received as St. Paul would write), and (3) the teaching of the Apostles' successors (what we today refer to as the Teaching Magisterium which you can find in a couple of resources: Densinger or Tanner). Ireneaus' list is almost the same as the New Testament we know today.

Because the super-gatherings often included local churches which had been part of some other super-gathering, Churches from a far broader area of the world undertook to promote their canons of approved works of Sacred Scripture. Around the year 400, enough of these big Councils had been held that the greater part of the Church was using much the same collection of writings and soon thereafter the New Testament as we know it gelled into place.

Many of the works which did not gain approval to be included in the New Testament remained available for reading and study and a number of them exerted a lot of influence on the Church. Here's an example:

The Angel Gabriel announced to Mary that she was to bear a child and name him Jesus. Everybody in town grew excited as this news was shared but saddened that Mary was not married and the divine child would have no father figure. There was nothing for it but that a suitable spouse should be found. The elders decided to parade all the eligible young men past Mary and a miracle would let them know which one God had chosen. All the boys in town, and from several neighboring villages, were led past Mary and nothing happened. What could be done now? Ah, the eldest of the elders, old Joseph the Carpenter, hadn't been in on the original plan, so let's drag him over here and get his advice. Joseph is led in, tottering on weakened, ancient leg, held up by a stout old stick. And when he stood in front of Mary the stick took root and lilies burst from the top.

This relatively unknown story has had interesting repercussions: the "miracle" described gave the Church an old man as Jesus' foster father and the lilies still bursting from his staff in just about every statue you'll ever see of the saint. The previously mentioned Lost Books of The Bible includes this account, which is not in our New Testament as this story is among those deemed fantasy rather than fact. However, this example pays tribute to the difficult and serious work of evaluating what to include in the Bible with which are familiar.

The Celebration of Sacraments

<u>Infant Baptism</u>: The Sacrament of Baptism is regularly celebrated during or after the Eucharistic Liturgy. Registered parishioners are asked to arrange for the Baptismal Preparation Class and the Liturgical Celebration by calling the Parish Office.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults: RCIA is the process of growing in your faith and love of God. Weekly gatherings take place from September until Easter. If you are interested in learning about Catholicism and joining us please call the church @ 419-243-1829.

Penance: The Sacrament of Penance is celebrated at 3:30 p.m. on Saturday at IC, 9:30 a.m. at HSP and 10:30 a.m. at IC every Sunday or by appointment.

Matrimony: Anyone planning to be married must contact the parish at least six months in advance. The exact date and time of your wedding should not be determined until after consultation with a priest or deacon. If either party has previously been civilly or religiously married, the Presider is not permitted to set a date for the wedding without resolving the previous marriage.

<u>Pastoral Care of the Sick</u>: When a parishioner is admitted to the hospital, nursing home, or confined to home because of age or infirmity, please call the Parish Office. Parishioners are ready to visit and to bring Holy Communion. When one is seriously ill, the healing Presence of the Lord should be requested in the Sacrament of the Sick.



Our Civic and Moral Duty

To be a voice in the public square during these days when voting is taking place on Issue 1, I recently presented an Op-Ed, "What is the Issue?," to the secular press, which I present to you in this column. You will note that it intentionally does not use

Catholic language, no scripture quotes, no Catechism or Papal references. Why? Because today being today, the public often rejects outright anything which even hints of religion. Instead, the article is an appeal to reason! To assist you and those with whom you will interact, I want to provide this reasoned approach to thoroughly unreasonable amendment.

Constitution, Vote

Issue 1

Some will say it is a political issue. But this is not an issue of partisan politics, and we are not being asked to elect one candidate as opposed to another. This is not a democratic or republican issue; it is not an independent or green issue. Then what is it?

As Catholics, protecting, defending, nurturing and caring for all human life is a moral imperative. But the life of the most innocent, the most vulnerable, the most defenseless among us, the unborn baby in the womb, must be our preeminent concern. Issue 1 will take abortion to an unprecedented level, enshrining in our State Constitution the "right" to take the life of a baby, even one about to born!

"What is the Issue?"

"In these weeks and on November 7th, we will have the opportunity and responsibility as good citizens to cast a vote on Issue 1, a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Ohio. At first glance, some believe that the issue is only about keeping abortion legal, when in fact abortion is already legal

direct contradiction to the Declaration of Independence. which holds as a self-evident truth that all are endowed with

in the State of Ohio, up to fetal viability. This

amendment, however, seeks to make abortion, in its

most radical form, a right enshrined in our

the first unalienable right: the right to life. So abortion, in the end, is not the issue Then what is?

Some will say it is a religious issue. But this is not an issue of religious affiliation, and not the sole concern of one religion as opposed to another. This is not a Catholic or Evangelical issue; it is not a Muslim or Jewish issue. Then what is it?

Some will say it is an individual issue. But this is not an issue affecting only one person or concerning only certain members of our society. This is not a "my" issue or a "your" issue; it is not a liberal or conservative issue. Then what is it?

So what is the issue? Simply put, it is a human issue! The proposed amendment should compel all persons of goodwill who are committed to human rights, to human development, to human flourishing, to human protections and to human goodness, to vote no for one reason: the amendment is inhuman.

Inhuman because rejects and disrespects the rights of women and girls of Ohio, inhuman because rejects and disrespects the rights of parents, inhuman because rejects and disrespects the rights of the baby about to be born.

the language of the amendment, one understands that the issue, in the end, is not the legality of abortion, but human rights. There is a reason that the language of the amendment never mentions familiar human language: woman, girl, mother, father, parent, child, baby. There is a reason the crafters of the amendment language were enraged when more human language was included in the final version of the ballot. I invite you to read the language of the amendment itself, and seriously to consider what the language really means here: www.toledodiocese.org/voteno.

Read the language and read between the lines! Make no mistake, the proposed amendment would not only enshrine abortion into the Ohio Constitution, but take it to its furthest extreme by placing women and girls at risk in an unregulated abortion environment, by undermining the rights of parents to know if their young children are being counseled, encouraged and assisted in having abortions or receiving life changing hormonal treatments against their will, and by permitting late term abortions through nine months of pregnancy, even up until birth!

How telling to note that as humans, we delight in the announcement of the zoo that an animal mother is pregnant, we anxiously await the birth of her babies,

even name them before they are born, and mourn them if they are lost! How telling to note that in a great many schools in the State of Ohio, parents or

guardians must give permission for their minor children to receive even an aspirin; and according to Ohio law, they must sign a application for a driver's license or permit, they must give consent for their minor child to have their ears pierced or to get a tattoo. According to

the proposed amendment, however, a minor could have a life altering surgical procedure without the consent of parents!

So what is the issue? Issue 1 is not a political issue, it is not a religious issue, it is not an individual issue. In the end, Issue 1 is a human issue that affects all persons and our entire community, regardless of political or religious affiliations.

As human persons, we are created good, we are made for good and made to do good. I encourage all people of goodwill to exercise their right to vote, to defend human rights, and to vote no on Issue 1 in accord with our human nature!

In closing, dear friends, you've heard me say and I say it again: to be Catholic is to be Pro-Life, from conception to natural death. The amendment on which we are being asked to vote is nothing short of evil. I urge you to exercise your civic duty to vote, and I urge you to fulfill your moral duty to vote NO on Issue 1.
