Dear People of God,

The Eucharist is many things for many people; the current focus on Eucharistic Renewal seeks to remind us of those "many things." For most today it's the celebration of the Eucharist within the context of the Mass. I'll return to that eventually because I think many of us misunderstand the celebration, its roots and its purpose; however, allow me to lay out some of the other ways the Eucharist as the very presence of Jesus Christ is in our midst. Of course, what is most significant about the Eucharist is that Jesus Christ chooses to make himself present, humanity and divinity, under the external appearance of bread and wine. Because he's God, Jesus can accomplish things we cannot; in the Eucharist God chooses to use the materials of bread and wine, wheat and grapes, to change them completely so that while they may look, smell and taste like mere bread and wine, they have undergone a change in what they are that replaces everything that makes them bread and wine to become everything that makes them Jesus (you can look up transubstantiation on the web and follow the action in a much more complex explanation).

Once bread and wine have become Body and Blood, the Church asks us to revere the presence of Jesus in a number of very different ways. One of the oldest of those was the reservation of the Eucharistic elements for the sick. When people were not able to come to church due to illness, imprisonment or some other reason, the Church went to them and took along the Blessed Sacrament. The Church still does, assuring that those who cannot be part of the celebrating community can still be part of it by receiving the gift of Jesus' real presence.

The reservation of the Eucharist led to the development of a fit place within the church to keep the real presence. Many early church buildings had a container suspended by a rope or chain to assure the protection of the Blessed Sacrament from all those little things that could so easily carry it off to a nest or eat it right there. Knowing that these containers, and the elaborate bronze or stone tabernacles which replaced them, held the true presence of Jesus/God, people would stop by the church to spend some quiet time thinking about, talking to, and listening for Jesus. Ordinary piety led to a great devotion and respect for the reserved Sacrament.

The Church recognized the general respect of the people and began to make their time with the Sacrament more meaningful by bringing the Eucharist out of the tabernacle and placing it in a device (the monstrance or ostensorium) so that it was visible to those showing their respect and offering a greater opportunity to adore Jesus humbling himself to be present to us all.

Over the years much of the general piety of the people has disappeared, in large part because contemporary culture demeans the miraculous with a falling off in the belief in the real presence. The Church continues to teach that in the Eucharist, God is truly present: Jesus is there just as he was there for the disciples. The current renewal seeks to make all of us more and more aware of that real presence and the love of God revealed in it.

The Celebration of Sacraments

<u>Infant Baptism</u>: The Sacrament of Baptism is regularly celebrated during or after the Eucharistic Liturgy. Registered parishioners are asked to arrange for the Baptismal Preparation Class and the Liturgical Celebration by calling the Parish Office.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults: RCIA is the process of growing in your faith and love of God. Weekly gatherings take place from September until Easter. If you are interested in learning about Catholicism and joining us please call the church @ 419-243-1829.

Penance: The Sacrament of Penance is celebrated at 3:30 p.m. on Saturday at IC, 9:30 a.m. at HSP and 10:30 a.m. at IC every Sunday or by appointment.

Matrimony: Anyone planning to be married must contact the parish at least six months in advance. The exact date and time of your wedding should not be determined until after consultation with a priest or deacon. If either party has previously been civilly or religiously married, the Presider is not permitted to set a date for the wedding without resolving the previous marriage.

Pastoral Care of the Sick: When a parishioner is admitted to the hospital, nursing home, or confined to home because of age or infirmity, please call the Parish Office. Parishioners are ready to visit and to bring Holy Communion. When one is seriously ill, the healing Presence of the Lord should be requested in the Sacrament of the Sick.

Health News for February 11, 2024

Hypothermia: What should you do? Take the person's temperature. If it is below 95 degrees the situation is an emergency, so get medical attention immediately. If medical care is not available, begin warming the person, as follows:

- Move to a warm room or shelter.
- Remove any wet clothing from the victim.
- Warm the center of the body first chest, neck, head, and groin — using an electric blanket, if available, or warm compresses. Use skin-to-skin contact under loose, dry layers of blankets, clothing, towels, or sheets.
- Provide the victim with non-alcoholic warm beverages but no alcohol to help increase body temperature. Do not try to give beverages to an unconscious person.
- Keep the person dry and wrapped including the head and neck in a warm blanket even if the body temperature has increased.
- Stay with the person until medical help arrives.

Do not do the following:

- Do not assume that someone found lying motionless in the cold is already dead.
- Do not use direct heat (such as hot water, a heating pad, or a heat lamp) to warm the person.
- Do not give the person alcohol.
