Dear People of God,

As I acknowledged a few weeks ago, I have often been asked why the Church doesn't preach on important social issues the way many Protestant Churches do. In fact, preaching at Mass is to be drawn from and make relevant the three readings, so all too often issues which might otherwise be timely get overridden by what Jesus has to say. Although some of those topical issues occasionally subtly surface, the three-year cycle of readings make the opportunity to preach about them rare. More often than not, a pastor or bishop will provide written material that shows up in the bulletin but that only touches those who read it. This series is just such an attempt to address some topical concerns.

Because the tragedy of child abuse of all kinds has become rampant all across society, from clergy to coaches to parents and strangers in the park, let's begin with that. In Jesus' era, regardless of the nation, children didn't count for much. They were considered property of the family under the absolute control of the oldest male member who could deal with them as he pleased. Many children born with deformities or health problems were left out in the night for a passing beast to devour or the gods to take in their sleep. Marriages were arranged, often when children were seven or eight; women were literally given away and no longer had any claim against their biological family. Long before Diocletian mandated that children follow the career path of their father, that was the general rule and tradition for the guys; in large families, even in wealthy ones (although many wealthy families chose not to have children who interrupted their idyllic lifestyle), the youngest children were often abandoned, sold, or handed over to wandering teachers like Jesus.

We find very little about children in the gospels and not much more in the Old Testament. However, the central point of these texts is that children are innocents who should be treated as such, with tender care and love. That was really unusual for that time period. The Old Testament suggests that children are close to God and can hear him better than adults. Four of the texts specifically remind adults to bring children to church and two refer to the unborn as being children of God with an identity and purpose from the moment they're conceived. Jesus has a warning for abusers: it would be better to have a millstone around your neck and be thrown in the sea to drown than to offend even one of these little ones.

Given the infrequent references, we should all pay attention to the documents issued by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops reflecting on what is available from Scripture. They have a lot to say about the issue of child abuse of every kind: neglect - emotional, physical, sexual, and more. Many of these official documents have been transformed into program materials on FORMED, but if you don't follow the USCCB or FORMED, you won't know any of this and may conclude that the Church "doesn't care." It does, but you need to go to the official Church to see it. Take time to learn and be informed where your Church stands and what she is doing to address this serious issue.

The Celebration of Sacraments

Infant Baptism: The Sacrament of Baptism is regularly celebrated during or after the Eucharistic Liturgy. Registered parishioners are asked to arrange for the Baptismal Preparation Class and the Liturgical Celebration by calling the Parish Office.

Penance: The Sacrament of Penance is celebrated at 3:30 p.m. on Saturday at IC, 9:30 a.m. at HSP and 10:30 a.m. at IC every Sunday or by appointment.

Matrimony: Anyone planning to be married must contact the parish at least six months in advance. The exact date and time of your wedding should not be determined until after consultation with a priest or deacon. If either party has previously been civilly or religiously married, the Presider is not permitted to set a date for the wedding without resolving the previous marriage.

<u>Pastoral Care of the Sick</u>: When a parishioner is admitted to the hospital, nursing home, or confined to home because of age or infirmity, please call the Parish Office. Parishioners are ready to visit and to bring Holy Communion. When one is seriously ill, the healing Presence of the Lord should be requested in the Sacrament of the Sick.

Health News for February 16, 2025



Winter Skin Care: Cleanse and Exfoliate. Cleansers and exfoliators help to keep skin clean and prevent breakouts and clogged pores. But over exfoliating can break the skin's barrier and cause inflammation or irritation. During winter months, it is recommended to use a mild cleanser and to exfoliate two to three times per week. Apply using gentle, circular motions with your fingertips or a washcloth to rid your skin of dead skin cells and help to stimulate blood flow to your skin, giving it a bright and healthy glow. Protect Your Skin from the Environment. Just because you may not feel the sun's warmth in the winter months, doesn't mean your skin is not enduring it's harmful UV rays. In fact, on a clear sunny day in winter, snow can reflect up to 90% of UV rays back onto you. This means you could be exposed to twice as many harmful rays while enjoying the outdoors. Always include a sunscreen with a minimum of SPF 30 protection in your daily skin care routine. In addition, consider wearing a scarf and hat to protect your exposed skin from the elements, including sunlight.

Snow Emergency

Whenever a county/city within the Diocese of Toledo is placed under a Level 3 Snow Emergency during which all roadways are closed to nonemergency personnel, the Catholic Churches within that geographic region will cancel the scheduled Saturday Vigil, Sunday, or Holy Day Masses. Roman Catholics in that region, therefore, are dispensed from the obligation to attend Mass. If Masses are cancelled, Catholics are encouraged to participate in Holy Mass via television, radio or internet, making a spiritual Communion. When Mass is cancelled. all other diocesan, parish, or school events in the geographic area are also cancelled.



Last year we included a hygiene bag to the school children from fourth to eighth grade who received a coat. Our LAYETTE program supplies a newborn layette package full of essential items for underserved new mothers to take home with their newborns. We supply over 1,000 layettes each year to local hospitals and social service agencies for distribution to moms in need of these resources. Tutoring students in Reading and Math skills at four local elementary schools is a favorite program for CCS Toledo members. Running and staffing the school libraries at two of the schools is also a CCS Toledo program.




