Dear People of God,

Another topic we seldom preach about because the scriptures so seldom include them is the general issue of addiction. As I'm sure we all know, addictions of all sorts can be found in our community and some of them are deadly. Perhaps the most life-threatening is the abuse of drugs caused by addiction to the effects they arouse.

As I hope you know, the founder of the three Irish parishes here in Toledo did not initially come to establish any parish. Fr. Hannin was a significant force in the national temperance movement. He "took the pledge" at the age of thirteen from Theobald Mathew, a priest of Ireland who founded the Cork Total Abstinence Society. Other than the small amount of wine he used for Mass, he did not drink alcohol because he knew of its deleterious effects on the addict and on the addict's family. It isn't at all unusual to read about someone driving a vehicle under the influence of alcohol who kills innocent others by driving recklessly.

Most addictions are to substances which change one's affect state (emotional well-being). Many drugs enhance feelings of comfort and happiness. In a world which presents people with so much negativity and bad feelings, many turn to things which shut off the bad and create an artificial good. Unfortunately, the use begins to grow weak in its effect so the addict takes more. We all know that the results can be ruinous: criminal behavior to get the money for the drugs, side-effects which deteriorate one's health and in far too many cases, overdoses which kill.

The Church believes that as individuals and as a community, we all have an obligation to avoid those things which create an artificial environment mentally, physically or emotionally because what they actually do is remove us from the community and can cause irreparable harm to self and others. But the underlying problem is that far too many addictions occur entirely by accident, without our ever noticing. Take, for example, your cell phone. Are you addicted? Is it off during Mass or are you expecting an important call or text that can't wait for your encounter with Jesus to come to its end?

Dealing with addictions does call for prayer but the real answer will far more often come from an honest admission that we require the intervention of health-care professionals. Think about those things you crave, can't do without or which seem to be ever-present and distract from participating in society. They may be addictions.

Pastoral Care of the Sick: When a parishioner is admitted to the hospital, nursing home, or confined to home because of age or infirmity, please call the Parish Office. Parishioners are ready to visit and to bring Holy Communion. When one is seriously ill, the healing Presence of the Lord should be requested in the Sacrament of the Sick.




Snow removal around our church is very important for your safe entry into church, but is also very pricey. This is the first year in several that we have been

The Diocese of Toledo is in compliance with the articles of the Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People (Charter) of the United

States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB). Every year, the Diocese dutifully submits the necessary documentation required by the USCCB for a diocese to be in compliance.

Every three years an on-site audit is conducted, when not only all necessary documentation is dutifully submitted, but in addition, Pastoral Center, parish and diocesan school employees are interviewed concerning practices and protocols related to creating and maintaining a safe environment for our children and youth.

The last 3-year audit was conducted in September 2024 and all audited Articles within the Charter were found to be compliant. The next on-site audit will be conducted in 2027.

The Diocese of Toledo remains committed to ensuring the protection of children and providing a safe environment for all young people. If you have any knowledge of abuse that has been committed by a cleric, or any personnel of the Catholic Church, you are urged to report the abuse to your local police department, Children Services, and the Diocesan Victim Assistance Coordinator at (419) 214-4880 or by mail at 1933 Spielbusch Avenue, Toledo, Ohio 43604.

"The Pursuit of the Common Good and Human Dignity: The Catholic Approach to Immigration"

As Bishop and Shepherd of the faithful in the immigration laws is the right of every nation and is Diocese of Toledo, I find it necessary to speak with not in itself an affront to this dignity. Nations in their

clarity amidst the confusion and polarization that currently surrounds the issue of immigration, which has recently come to the forefront of our national discussion

As recently reiterated by Archbishop Timothy Broglio, President of the United States

Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), "The Catholic Church is not aligned with any political party... No matter who occupies the White House or holds the majority on Capitol Hill, the Church's teachings remain unchanged." Immigration issues are complex and we must be diligent in offering and advocating for the Church's teaching, especially concerning the common good and each person's right to human dignity.

Catholic Social Teaching has as its first principle the affirmation that every human being is made in the image and likeness of God and therefore possesses an inviolable dignity. Enforcement of just



foreigner and the responsibility to regulate national borders) which must be held together in balance The disregard or overemphasis of either principle will lead to a distortion of the Church's full teaching on this vital issue.

First: "The more prosperous nations are obliged, to the extent they are able, to welcome the foreigner in search of the security and the means of livelihood which he cannot find in his country of origin. Public authorities should see to it that the natural right is respected that places a guest under the protection of those who receive him" (CCC 2241).

- deploys excessive violence in enforcement of the law, except where needed to protect lives.
- The second principle, which balances the first, states: "Political authorities, for the sake of the
 - common good for which they are responsible, may make the exercise of the right to immigrate subject to various juridical conditions, especially with regard to the immigrants' duties toward their country of adoption. Immigrants are obliged to respect with gratitude the material and spiritual heritage of the country that receives them, to obey its laws and to assist in carrying civic burdens" (CCC 2241).

Because of this, we must reject any immigration policy (or lack thereof) which:

- illegal encourages normalizes or immigration.
- leads to de-facto "open borders," which harm the common good of both
